The Celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus, the Christ, from the dead

A great candle burns in the centre of the Church. It is the Paschal candle which is lit from the new fire at the Easter Vigil early in the morning, and symbolises the resurrected Presence of Christ.

The candle is inscribed with traditional signs: the cross, the symbol of life and death; the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet, Alpha and Omega, a reminder that Christ is the beginning and end of all things; the numerals of the current year, a reminder that the Lord of all ages is present here and now; and five 'nails' inserted in the shape of the cross, symbolising the wounds of Christ.

In the early centuries of the church's history, Baptism and Easter were intimately linked. This season was, in fact, the only time in the whole year when baptisms regularly took place. The new converts at their baptism in this way sacramentally entered into Christ's redeeming death and resurrection at the same time as the whole church celebrated its memorial of these events. It is therefore most appropriate that the Easter Liturgy should include the Reaffirmation of Baptismal Vows by the congregation, as the completion of their Lenten observance and as an affirmation of their union with Christ in his death and resurrection.

After the sermon, as the sacred ministers move to the font, we turn our attention to the baptistry. At the 6:00am Vigil, individual candles were lit from the Paschal Candle, gradually spreading light through the church. This spreading light symbolises the renewal of the whole church, to which we shall give voice today in the reaffirmation of our own baptismal promises.

The font is the birthplace of the church. The Spirit of the Risen Christ is received in Baptism. Recalling at Easter our own baptism, we commit ourselves afresh to the risen Lord of Life.



First Reading Acts 10: 34 - 43

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

Peter began to speak to them: 'I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ—he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.'

Then comes the end, when he hands over the kingdom to God the Father, after he has destroyed every ruler and every authority and power. For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. The last enemy to be destroyed is death.

John 20.1-18

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went towards the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes.

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping?' She said to them, 'They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him.' When she had said this, she turned round and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping? For whom are you looking?' Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, 'Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away.' Jesus said to her, 'Mary!' She turned and said to him Hebrew, Rabbouni!' (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, 'Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God."' Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, 'I have seen the Lord'; and she told them that he had said these things to her.'

Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship in the breaking of the bread, and in the prayers?

Will you persevere in resisting evil, and whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord?

Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ?

I will, with God's help.

Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbour as yourself?

I will, with God's help.

Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being?



The Silent Epidemic: Unravelling the Complexities of Loneliness Among Young Australians

In the bustling cities and quiet towns across Australia, a silent epidemic is taking hold among the nation's youth. While the majority of young adults navigate their daily lives with a sense of connection and belonging, an increasing number are grappling with a pervasive sense of loneliness. This phenomenon, once primarily associated with the elderly, has now emerged as a significant concern for those in the prime of their lives. In an Australian study of nearly 1500 adolescents and young adults, more than one in three (37%) young adults aged 18–25 indicated a problematic level of loneliness.

This seminar based on the recent Publica report by Hannah Weickhardt and Patrick Parkinson explores the issue and what can be done about it.



Professor Patrick Parkinson AM is Executive Director of Publica, a Christian think tank concerned with strengthening families and communities. He is an expert on family law and child protection. From 2004-2007 he was Chairperson of the Family Law Council, an advisory body to the federal government, and also chaired a review of the Child Support system in 2004-05 which led to the engagement of major.


