Great Vigil of Easter

Our celebration today is the climax of the Church's Year. This service is a vigil for the Lord, awaiting the dawn of the great Day of Resurrection, the day on which all the lesser Sundays or 'little Easters' throughout the year depend.

- The Liturgy has four parts:
- The Liturgy of the Light, when the new fire and Paschal candle are lit;
- The *Ministry of the Word*, when the lessons from the Scriptures are read, and we recall God's great saving acts from the beginning;
- The Liturgy of Baptism and the Renewal of Baptismal Vows; and
- The Great Thanksgiving and Easter Communion.

Liturgy of the Light

The new fire is lit, symbolising the renewal of the Church. The Paschal Candle is inscribed with the sign of the cross, the symbol of life and death; the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet, Alpha and Omega, a reminder that Christ is the beginning and end of all things; and this year of salvation, the year in which our redemption is made present to us here and now. Five grains of incense signifying the wounds of Christ are inserted into the Paschal Candle, and the Candle, lit from the fire, becomes the symbol of the resurrection of Christ. The procession into the darkened church recalls the night of the exodus from Egypt, which for us has become the passage of the people of God with Christ from darkness to the light of the resurrection. As soon as everyone has entered, the church is filled with lighted candles and the *Exultet* is sung.

The *Exultet* celebrates the mystery of Christ's dying and rising. It is a chant dating from the fourth century, sung in praise of Christ's triumph over darkness, and of the candle as the sign of this triumph. All the candles which have been lit from this one candle produce a blaze of illumination in the darkness and celebrate the living presence of Christ in his church now.

Ministry of the Word

The readings follow the themes of creation and re-creation: the crossing of the Red Sea, which reminds us of the waters of our baptism; the cleansing and renewal of the church by the gift of the Spirit of the Risen Christ; the mystery of Baptism which identifies us with the risen Christ; and the resurrection narrative itself.

Liturgy of Baptism

The font is the birthplace of the church. The spirit of the Risen Christ is received in Baptism.

At this point in the liturgy, we all commit ourselves afresh to the Risen Lord of life.

Great Thanksgiving and Easter Communion

The Eucharist begins with an explosion of joy and sound in the *Gloria in excelsis*. It is the great song of triumph which echoes the *Exultet*. The *Exultet* is sung amidst the blaze of illuminated candles. The *Gloria*, however, is sung after the sun itself has risen, reminding us that the light of the Risen Christ has dawned upon the whole creation. Bread and wine are now brought to the altar, and the whole church is called to that table which the Lord himself prepared for his people through his death and resurrection. Praise Him!

Please advise one of the Sidespersons if you would like Communion brought to you in the pew.

If necessary, you are welcome to sit for those parts of the liturgy when it is normal to stand.

The Celebrant, sacred ministers, and people gather in the darkness outside the church. The unlit Paschal candle is held.

LITURGY OF THE LIGHT

Celebrant

Beloved in Christ, on this holy morning, when our Lord Jesus Christ passed from death to life, the Church invites her members throughout the world to come together in vigil and prayer. This is the Passover of the Lord. We recall his death and resurrection by hearing his word, celebrating his mysteries, and accepting his promise of life; and we are confident that we shall share his victory over death in his eternal kingdom.

Eternal God, who made this most holy morning to shine with the brightness of your one true light: set us aflame with the fire of your love, and bring us to the radiance of your heavenly glory; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

All Amen.

The Celebrant takes the Paschal candle.

Christ yesterday and today, the beginning and the end, *Alpha* and *Omega*, all time belongs to him and all the ages; to him be glory and power, through every age and for ever.

Amen.

The five nails containing grains of incense are inserted.

By his holy and glorious wounds may Christ our Lord guard and keep us.

Amen.

The Celebrant lights the candle.

May the light of Christ, rising in glory, banish all darkness from our hearts and minds.

The procession makes its way into the church. Once the congregation takes its place in the pews, the deacon and people make the following acclamation -

Deacon The Light of Christ

All Thanks be to God.

This acclamation is made three times. The light from the Candle, which represents the Risen Christ, is gradually passed throughout the congregation.


Exultet – The Proclamation of Easter

The Exultet is a song of joy sung in praise of God for the threefold glory of this night on which Israel was led from Egypt, Christ rose from the dead, and Christians today enter into his risen life. This hymn is the most ancient part of the Easter liturgies still shared by Christians of Eastern and Western traditions.

Please sit.

Rejoice heavenly powers! Sing, choirs of angels! O Universe, dance around God's throne. Jesus Christ our King is risen! Sound the victorious trumpet of salvation! Sing with joy, O earth, illumined with this celestial radiancy: and enlightened by the eternal King of glory, believe and know you have put away the darkness of all humankind. Rejoice, O earth, in glory, revealing the splendour of your creation, radiant in the brightness of your triumphant King! Christ has conquered! Now his life and glory fill you! Darkness vanishes forever. Rejoice, O Mother Church. Exult in glory! The risen Saviour, our Lord of life, shines upon you. Let all God's people sing and shout for joy. I pray and beseech you therefore, dearly beloved, that all you who are here present, seeking this heavenly brightness, make your supplication with me to the Almighty, that he would make me worthy to praise this gift of fire with thankfulness. Through Jesus Christ our Mediator and Redeemer: who lives and reigns with him and the Holy Spirit, ever one God, world without end.

It is right and good that with hearts and minds and voices we should praise you, Father almighty, the unseen God, through your only Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who has saved us by his death, paid the price of Adam's sin; and reconciled us once again to you.

Now therefore our Passover, we Sacrifice, wherein for us the very Lamb of God is slain: by whose Blood the doors of his faithful people are made holy. This is the night, wherein, when our fathers, the children of Israel, were led forth out of Egypt, you divided the sea and made them pass over, as on dry land. Yea, this is the night, that with the fiery pillar has purged away the darkness of our condemnation. This is the night, whereby all that believe in Christ upon the face of all the earth, delivered from this wicked world and out of the shadow of death, are renewed by grace, and are made partakers of eternal life. This is the night, wherein the bonds of death were loosed, and Christ harrowing hell rose again in triumph. For why should we be born into this world, save that being born we may be redeemed? How wonderful then, O God, is your loving kindness to us your children. Behold, what manner of love our God has bestowed upon us: who to redeem a servant, delivered up his only Son. O wonderful providence of Adam's transgression, that by such a death, sin might be done away. O blessed iniquity, for whose redemption such a price was paid by such a Saviour. O Night verily blessed, to you alone that time and that hour were made manifest, when our Saviour Christ rose again from death to life. This is the night, whereof David said: "The night is as clear as the day: then shall my night be turned to day."

The mystery therefore of this most holy night puts to flight the deeds of darkness, purges away sin: restores innocence to the fallen, and gladness to all those who mourn: casts out hatred, brings peace to all humankind, and bows down mighty princes. O Night, verily blessed which did spoil the people of Egypt and magnified the Hebrews. O Night, wherein heaven and earth are joined, and humankind partakes with the Godhead.

Therefore, heavenly Father, in this our Easter joy accept our sacrifice of praise, your Church's solemn offering; this wax, the work of bees and the hands of your ministers. As we gaze upon the splendour of this flame fed by the melting wax conceived by mother bee, grant that this Easter candle may make our darkness light.

We pray you, therefore, O most Merciful: that this candle which we have lighted and consecrated before you in your own name, may continue to shine forth without ceasing, and may vanquish all the shades of darkness. We beseech you, therefore, O most Merciful: that you would direct and guide us your servants, and the hearts of all your faithful family: and all those that minister in your service: your servants Kanishka and Michael our Bishops, so helping us with continual grace, that we may pass our time in rest and quietness, in the glad solemnity of our redemption. Give grace also to all those who rule in authority over us, and by the immeasurable gift of your love and pity direct their thoughts towards righteousness and peace, that they, together with all your people, may come from the toils of this world to their heavenly country.

For Christ the morning star has risen in glory; Christ is risen from the dead and his flame of love still burns within us! Christ sheds his peaceful light on all the world! Christ lives and reigns for ever and ever!





THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

Celebrant

Dear friends in Christ, let us now listen attentively to the word of God, recalling how God saved his people throughout history and, in the fullness of time, sent Jesus Christ to be our Redeemer.

First Reading

Genesis 22: 1–18

read by Carol Webster

After these things God tested Abraham. He said to him, 'Abraham!' And he said, 'Here I am.' He said, 'Take your son, your only son Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah, and offer him there as a burnt-offering on one of the mountains that I shall show you.' So Abraham rose early in the morning, saddled his donkey, and took two of his young men with him, and his son Isaac; he cut the wood for the burnt-offering, and set out and went to the place in the distance that God had shown him. On the third day Abraham looked up and saw the place far away. Then Abraham said to his young men, 'Stay here with the donkey; the boy and I will go over there; we will worship, and then we will come back to you.' Abraham took the wood of the burntoffering and laid it on his son Isaac, and he himself carried the fire and the knife. So the two of them walked on together. Isaac said to his father Abraham, 'Father!' And he said, 'Here I am, my son.' He said, 'The fire and the wood are here, but where is the lamb for a burnt-offering?' Abraham said, 'God himself will provide the lamb for a burnt-offering, my son.' So the two of them walked on together. When they came to the place that God had shown him, Abraham built an altar there and laid the wood in order. He bound his son Isaac, and laid him on the altar, on top of the wood. Then Abraham reached out his hand and took the knife to kill his son. But the angel of the Lord called to him from heaven, and said, 'Abraham, Abraham!' And he said, 'Here I am.' He said, 'Do not lay your hand on the boy or do anything to him; for now I know that you fear God, since you have not withheld your son, your only son, from me.' And Abraham looked up and saw a ram, caught in a thicket by its horns. Abraham went and took the ram and offered it up as a burnt-offering instead of his son. So Abraham called that place 'The Lord will provide'; as it is said to this day, 'On the mount of the Lord it shall be provided.'

The angel of the Lord called to Abraham a second time from heaven, and said, 'By myself I have sworn, says the Lord: Because you have done this, and have not withheld your son, your only son, I will indeed bless you, and I will make your offspring as numerous as the stars of heaven and as the sand that is on the seashore. And your offspring shall possess the gate of their enemies, and by your offspring shall all the nations of the earth gain blessing for themselves, because you have obeyed my voice.'

Second Reading

Exodus 14: 10-31; 15: 20-21a

As Pharaoh drew near, the Israelites looked back, and there were the Egyptians advancing on them. In great fear the Israelites cried out to the Lord. They said to Moses, 'Was it because there were no graves in Egypt that you have taken us away to die in the wilderness? What have you done to us, bringing us out of Egypt? Is this not the very thing we told you in Egypt, "Let us alone and let us serve the Egyptians"? For it would have been better for us to serve the Egyptians than to die in the wilderness.' But Moses said to the people, 'Do not be afraid, stand firm, and see the deliverance that the Lord will accomplish for you today; for the Egyptians whom you see today you shall never see again. The Lord will fight for you, and you have only to keep still.'

Then the Lord said to Moses, 'Why do you cry out to me? Tell the Israelites to go forward. But you lift up your staff, and stretch out your hand over the sea and divide it, that the Israelites may go into the sea on dry ground. Then I will harden the hearts of the Egyptians so that they will go in after them; and so I will gain glory for myself over Pharaoh and all his army, his chariots, and his chariot drivers. And the Egyptians shall know that I am the Lord, when I have gained glory for myself over Pharaoh, his chariots, and his chariot drivers.' The angel of God who was going before the Israelite army moved and went behind them; and the pillar of cloud moved from in front of them and took its place behind them. It came between the army of Egypt and the army of Israel. And so the cloud was there with the darkness, and it lit up the night; one did not come near the other all night.

Then Moses stretched out his hand over the sea. The Lord drove the sea back by a strong east wind all night, and turned the sea into dry land; and the waters were divided. The Israelites went into the sea on dry ground, the waters forming a wall for them on their right and on their left.

The Egyptians pursued, and went into the sea after them, all of Pharaoh's horses, chariots, and chariot drivers. At the morning watch the Lord in the pillar of fire and cloud looked down upon the Egyptian army, and threw the Egyptian army into panic. He clogged their chariot wheels so that they turned with difficulty. The Egyptians said, 'Let us flee from the Israelites, for the Lord is fighting for them against Egypt.'

Then the Lord said to Moses, 'Stretch out your hand over the sea, so that the water may come back upon the Egyptians, upon their chariots and chariot drivers.' So Moses stretched out his hand over the sea, and at dawn the sea returned to its normal depth. As the Egyptians fled before it, the Lord tossed the Egyptians into the sea. The waters returned and covered the chariots and the chariot drivers, the entire army of Pharaoh that had followed them into the sea; not one of them remained. But the Israelites walked on dry ground through the sea, the waters forming a wall for them on their right and on their left.

Thus the Lord saved Israel that day from the Egyptians; and Israel saw the Egyptians dead on the seashore. Israel saw the great work that the Lord did against the Egyptians. So the people feared the Lord and believed in the Lord and in his servant Moses.

Then the prophet Miriam, Aaron's sister, took a tambourine in her hand; and all the women went out after her with tambourines and with dancing. And Miriam sang to them:

The king of Israel, the Lord, is in your midst; you shall fear disaster no more. On that day it shall be said to Jerusalem: Do not fear, O Zion; do not let your hands grow weak. The Lord, your God, is in your midst, a warrior who gives victory; he will rejoice over you with gladness, he will renew you in his love; he will exult over you with loud singing as on a day of festival. I will remove disaster from you, so that you will not bear reproach for it. I will deal with all your oppressors at that time. And I will save the lame and gather the outcast, and I will change their shame into praise and renown in all the earth. At that time I will bring you home, at the time when I gather you; for I will make you renowned and praised among all the peoples of the earth, when I restore your fortunes before your eyes, says the Lord.

Fourth Reading

Romans 6: 3–11

Psalm 98: 1–4

Do you not know that all of us who have been baptised into Christ Jesus were baptised into his death? Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life.

For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. We know that our old self was crucified with him so that the body of sin might be destroyed, and we might no longer be enslaved to sin. For whoever has died is freed from sin. But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. The death he died, he died to sin, once for all; but the life he lives, he lives to God. So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus.




